POLICE PERSONNEL

PART TIME OFFICERS

The Police Department currently employs three (7) Part Time Police Officers. These Officers perform the same duties as the full time Police Officers. The part time officers are a necessity for the Police Department. Thanks to the part time Officers the Village has 24 hour coverage each day of the year. Part time officers are scheduled to work 48 hours per week in order for the Village to have the 24 hour coverage. Part time officers also fill in for the full time officers when they take vacation, sick days, training, emergency situations and assist the full time officers with the Firemen's festival.

In 2014 the Part Time Police Officers worked at total of 2456 hrs. The Village spent **\$28,355** in wages for the part time police officers services. Part-time officers are paid \$11.50 per hour with no benefits.

In 2014 three new officers were hired. Officer Tenore, from the Willard area, Officer Nutter from Shelby area and Officer Brock from Ashland area. The new officers came straight from a Police academy with no experience in Law Enforcement. Officer Gibson who was a part-time officer was promoted to full time officer status on November 4, 2014.

FULL TIME OFFICERS

The Village of Greenwich employees three (3) full time Police Officers. Chief of Police and two (2) Patrol Officers. Each Officer works a 40 hour work week. Full time Officers do on an occasion have to work overtime. The overtime consists of Court duty, investigations; fill in for officers when sick or on vacation, training and the Firemen's Festival. In 2014 two (2) full time Police Officers worked a total of 100 hrs in overtime.

RESERVE OFFICERS

The Greenwich Police Department has a reserve unit. These officers are Certified Police Officers through the State of Ohio. They have the same arrest powers as the full time and part time officers. The Reserve officer does not receive compensation from the Village. When they work as a police officer their time is voluntary. The Police Department currently has zero (0) Reserve Officers.

Officers of the Greenwich Police Department could not calculate total miles due to the odometer in Unit 2 shows over 40,000 miles were driven. The computer system in the vehicle was repaired thus making the odometer reading not actual miles.

The cost for the gasoline for cruisers in 2014 was **\$12,587.29**. The cruisers used 3856.17 **gallons** of gasoline. The average cost of gasoline for 2014 was **\$3.26 per gallon**. The average mileage per gallon of gasoline totaled 11 **miles per gallon**. The poor mileage is contributed to slow speeds in the village, idling while running radar, cold weather and hot weather. Officers have been instructed to turn the cruiser off if they are out of the cruiser for long periods of time to save on gasoline consumption.

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THE VILLAGE OF GREENWICH POLICE ACTIVITY REPORTS

May of 2014 the Greenwich Police Department started using a county wide computer system called ALERT. The only record available at this point will be the number of calls the Police Department handled. In 2014 the Greenwich Police Department handled calls 2367 Police calls.

Traffic Citations: In 2014 Greenwich Police Officers wrote 313 traffic violations. The majority of the citations were for exceeding the posted speed limits. Officer issued 395 warnings for traffic offenses to include parking violations.

Misdemeanor Summons: In 2014 Greenwich Police Officers wrote 59 criminal summons. **This does not include the Complaints that Village Attorney Steve Palmer wrote for the Police Department totaling 18 additional charges.**

Traffic Accidents: In 2014 the Greenwich Police Department investigated 13 Traffic Accidents.

TRAINING

On January 4, 2007 Ohio established legislation and created Ohio's Continuing Professional Training requirement. "All" certified Police Officers in the State of Ohio are required to have Continued Professional Training. To maintain your Police certification a Police Officer is mandated to complete three requirements in 2011:

- 1. Update training**
- 2. Annual Firearms qualification**
- 3. Continued Professional Training.**

The Police Officers at the Greenwich Police Department met all three requirements in 2014.

NORWALK MUNICIPAL COURT REPORT

- In 2014 The Greenwich Police Department had 121 criminal arrests.. Greenwich Officers issued 103 summons and Law Director issued 18 criminal complaints.
- In 2013 The Greenwich Police Department had 506 Traffic violation arrests that resulted in 506 convictions.
- The Greenwich Police Department has outstanding warrants for arrest of persons charged with a crime committed in Greenwich or warrants for failure to pay fines or serve jail time. Officer arrested 39 persons on warrants in 2013.
- The Greenwich Police Department accepted **\$2580.00** in bonds and/or waivers for the Norwalk Municipal Court in 2014.
- In 2014 the Greenwich Police Department received 12682.00 in traffic fines, 2638.85 in criminal fines for a total of **\$15320.85**. This money is placed in the General Fund.

PHYSICAL FITNESS IN 2014

In 2011 the Village Council passed legislation requiring all Police Officers to pass an approved Obstacle Course once each year. Failure to pass the course will result in termination of employment. The obstacle course is also a requirement for new applicants to pass before employment. The Police Department and Village council has recognized a need to have healthy Officers to help lower the cost of health insurance. The program is considered “preventive care”.

The obstacle course consists of the following tasks.

- 1. Exit the Cruiser**
- 2. Run 220 yards carrying a flash light**
- 3. Obstacle Course**
 - a. Go over a 42 inch wall**
 - b. Jump hurdles, 16 inches, 24 inches and 12 inches**
 - c. Weave around 9 cones 5 feet apart.**
 - d. Crawl on the ground a distance of 10 feet in a enclosed area no higher than 24 inches**
 - e. Run 50 feet to Dummy drag**
- 4. Dummy Drag**
 - a. Drag/carry 175 pound dummy 100 feet**
- 5. Reverse Obstacle Course**
- 6. Run 220 yards carrying flash light**
- 7. Load firearm and fire 6 rounds left hand and six rounds right hand into a target. Officer must shoot 80% (2 misses allow) Failure to shoot 80% will disqualify the Officer and he/she must repeat the entire course again.**
- 8. Return to vehicle.**

The physical abilities testing is a time event. All tasks are to be completed in a total time of 7 minutes and 9 seconds. Failure to complete any task of the test will be disqualification. Officer must complete course again.
